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1 Abbotts Ann

The crops of wheat in the parish of Abbotts Ann this year is very good; and, from what has been already threshed the produce per acre appears to be greater than it has been for many years. The barley in general is good; but about 60 acres of it suffered very much by a hail storm which fell on the 16th of July, which, it is supposed, destroyed one-half of what it would otherwise have produced. The oats and peas are a good average crop. Potatoes and turnips uncommonly good.

7 Alverstoke

About 78 acres of land in this parish cultivated as gardens, of which one-sixth part is planted with potatoes. About 61 acres of turnips sown after wheat, exclusive of the quantity mentioned in the opposite column.

10 Ashe

Wheat less than the usual proportion sown last year. Barley and oats both more than the customary proportion. Potatoes merely for private use. Beans none, not suited to the soil. Turnips in general considerable quantity, being absolutely necessary. Rye grass 100 acres maybe, but mostly fed, some cut for seed. Cinquefoil 96, vetches 18, mostly cut green for horses.

13 Barton Stacey

Wheat a good crop well harvested, barley very good, well harvested, oats a light crop, potatoes a good crop, peas a very good crop, and well harvested, turnips or rape uncommonly fine, and abundant, rye a good crop. Vetches 20 a good crop.

14/15 Basingstoke

I think it necessary to inform your Lordship that, in consequence of several farmers, within this parish, having refused to acquaint me with the number of acres under growth of wheat etc. within the present year, I am incapable of making the return, as lately directed by the Bishop of Winchester. If I may presume to submit a suggestion to your Lordship's consideration, I think that, as the farmers are in general so unwilling to make any return to the clergy from an idea that this circumstance would enable them to make a more correct estimate of the tithes, the placing this business forthwith under the direction of the commissioners of excise would be the means of furnishing his Majesty's Ministers with immediate and correct information.

12 Baughurst

From what I am able to collect from one farmer, (all the others having declined giving in any account) the annexed statement, is the usual growth of the parish. The land is cold and wet, and does not in the most favourable season produce more than half a load of threshed corn per acre. The crops of all kinds this year have been most abundant, at least three times the quantity of last year. The quality in general good. Underwood and fallow 100, taking the years together.

21 Bentworth

The average annual produce of the land is 20 bushels of wheat, 28 of (?) corn. There is no common or waste ground, the inclosures chiefly old, but, small part of the parish was in common field till (?) these six years, when an enclosure took place. Clover, sanfoin and artificial grasses occupy about 600 acres and the remaining part of the parish is meadow or woodland. About 12 or 1,500 sheep are kept and about 30 cows.

24 Bighton

Turnips in general failed, but the farmers viz. five, generally sow about 20 acres a year upon each of their farms. Potatoes, beans and rye, are not cultivated in this place, excepting about one acre planted annually by myself. The average produce of the crops in Bighton are nearly as follows viz. wheat 2½ quarters per acre, barley 2½-3, oats about the same.

25 Bishops Waltham

This statement is very far from being accurate, probably not half what it ought to be, as most of the principal occupiers of land, refuse to give the account required.

26 Blendworth

Wheat good, barley very good, oats very good, potatoes very fair, peas very good, turnips or rape good.

28 Boldre with Lymington and Brokenhurst

6 sacks per acre is the average produce of the land in the parish of Boldre.

32 Botley

This return comprises the number of acres of the different kinds of grain etc. as near as can be ascertained. But it ought to be remarked, that more than the usual quantity was sown last year, on account of the enormous high price.

39 Broughton with Bossington

The crops throughout the parish are universally good, but the wheat is not so good a colour as usual, if a judgement may be formed from the small quantity already threshed.

- 31 Burghclere with Newtown
 One of the principal farmers refused to give any account; and the whole is incorrect, nor can a proper account be procured without a regular surveyor of lands. The parish of Newtown is distinct from Burghclere.
- 42 Buriton with Petersfield
 A fair average crop.
- 43 Bursledon
 Bursledon is a very small parish and this return I think perfectly correct.
- 50 Catherington
 Wheat very good, barley very good, oats good, potatoes pretty fair, peas good, beans indifferent, turnips or rape very good.
- 53 Chawton
 The crop of all sorts of grain is uncommonly abundant and well housed.
- 54 Cheriton with Tichborne and Kilmeston
 This includes the return of Cheriton and Tichborne only. Of the number of acres sown in Kilmeston I have not yet been able to get a satisfactory account. As soon as I can procure such an account I will forward it. The farmers admit the produce per acre of this year to be much more abundant than the preceding. I think it may be concluded from their accounts that the difference is two-fifths or three-tenths in favour of this present year.
- 61 Christchurch with Holdenhurst
 This account of the quantity of cultivated acres of land in the two parishes is tolerably accurate having been taken not merely from the farmers' reports, but the actual survey of two persons appointed for the purpose.
- 65 Clanfield
 Wheat very good, barley good, oats very good, potatoes pretty fair, peas good, turnips or rape very good.
- 69 Colemore and Priors Dean (in Hampshire) and Harting (in Sussex)
 I have the honour to represent to your Lordship, that the occupiers of lands, in my parishes, have shown a persevering disinclination to make a return, as desired, of the various kinds of corn, grain, and other articles, and the number of acres planted with the same, according to a form transmitted to me; and, it has not availed, that I have said, I have the highest confidence in the benevolent intentions of His Majesty's Ministers.

73 Crawley with Hunton

Had a meeting on this business and one part of the farmers did not attend. N.B. but to say in general had a Great (?) . No return of any kind from Hunton.

79 Droxford

The produce of every species of grain in this parish has been most abundant. Many farms yielding a load of threshed wheat per acre. Much new ground broken up this year, which has been cultivated wholly for wheat. The parish of Droxford is nine in length: so that an accurate account of crops, could not have been depended upon, especially as the change of cultivation had taken place, before these papers were received, and the farmers are very ill disposed to supply the information requested of the clergy.

81 East Tisted

I have every reason to suppose, that this is a just return; and have only to observe further that, there is an extensive park in the parish which is not in tillage.

270 East Woodhay with Ashmansworth

A farmer Webb in my parish refused till this day; to deliver in his number of acres sown, which occasioned my Lord, your Lordship not receiving this paper before and no sort of neglect of mine.

248 East Worldham

This is but a small parish; and I think the return to be perfectly just. There is also hop ground in the parish.

82 Easton

There were no beans nor rye grown in the parish, nor any potatoes, excepting in the gardens.

87 Empshott

The remarks I have been able to collect are that the crops have been generally favourable. This is the statement received from the farmers etc. occupying land in the parish of Empshott between the 12th September and 13th October.

91 Eversley

Owing to the high price of this article, a considerable number of acres, more than usual, were sown with wheat last Michaelmas and of course there will be the less sown for a few years to come. Potatoes none worthy of notice grown in the parish the cultivation of this article being chiefly confined to our small gardens. The crops in general very good.

94 Exton

The average crop of wheat in this parish is half a load per acre. The average crop of barley is 3½ quarters per acre, of oats 4½.

- 96 Fareham
The Rev. John Aubry-Woolle vicar of Fareham made strict enquiries from every farmer in his parish; the inclosed number of acres sown with different kinds of grain, is the only return he could get. He judges, there might be if proper returns had been made by the different occupiers of land at a moderate computation, 1,000 acres sown with different species of grain.
- 97 Farlington
Potatoes exclusive of small gardens.
- 99 Farnborough
Wheat average produce per acre is 2½ qtrs, barley 3, oats 3, potatoes 400 bushels, peas 3 quarters, beans 4, rye 3.
- 98 Farringdon
The annexed return is I believe tolerably accurate.
- 102 Fordingbridge
This is I believe a very tolerably exact account.
- 110 Grateley
Vetches are included in the article of peas.
- 111 Greatham
The remarks I have been able to collect are, that the crops have been generally favourable. This is the statement received from the farmers and others occupying land in the parish of Greatham between 12th September and 13th October 1801.
- 114 Hamble
Hamble is a small parish and contains only one farm.
- 115 Hambleton
Potatoes exclusive of those grown in gardens.
- 117 Hartley Mauditt
A true account of this year's crop and very near a general average of the last 10 years. The soil is a particular one and bears good crops of wheat oats and peas but very indifferent barley and beans.
- 119 Hartley Wintney and Dogmersfield
In these parishes, in which the tithes are not taken in kind, the farmers are extremely unwilling to furnish the clergyman with any intelligence, which might possibly lead him to a knowledge of their value. Whatever accounts they produce; are more calculated to mislead, than to inform. This is at least the case in the two parishes of which I have the care. In one the principal is openly avowed, in the other it appears to be scarcely acted upon, as in

both the information received by Government has been withheld from me. Had the application been made from Government immediately to the churchwardens, the returns would have been made with little difficulty, and without suspicion. N.B. the observations apply to both parishes, though from some mistakes, I apprehend, with respect to the latter, no return has been required from me.

124 Hayling with Idsworth

Mr Henry Budd, Mr Joseph Crasler, farmers, would not give an account of what acres they had by which there is a deficiency in my account.

126 Headley

The number of acres of each species of grain greater than usual. The crops in general good.

127 Herriard

This is a true account according to the best information I could obtain from the different occupiers of land within the parish of Herriard for the present year.

129 Hackfield with Mattingley

Not a word of complaint against any article except peas, and against those the complaint is extremely light. One farmer says that he had this year 6 sacks on as much similar land as last year produced him only three.

128 Highclere

The greatest part of this parish is tithed free and the farmers refuse to give any account of the number of acres in growth and those that do give it are so much below the mark that I conceive any information I could communicate on the subject would only tend to mislead His Majesty's Ministers.

134 Hound with Netley

This return does not contain the quantity of potatoes sown by cottagers or others in their gardens. From the general aversion of the farmers to give in their own statements it is feared that the quantity returned is below the real no of acres. Most of the land in this parish is very productive of corn.

135 Hursley with Otterbourne

The parishes of Hursley and Otterbourne are so extensive (being nearly 40 miles in circumference) that it is impossible for the minister to obtain the information desired by His Majesty's Ministers with any degree of accuracy, by his own observation. In order therefore to procure it, he thought it most advisable to apply to the farmers themselves, which he did, either personally or by letter, to almost all of them: But out of upwards of 30 only 15 have made a report, the rest having either hesitated or

absolutely refused to give any information whatsoever. The numbers of acres of land therefore, entered into the opposite column (being the amount only of those reported to the minister) are supposed not to express half the quantity of land that was actually under growth of the several articles specified. N.B. much very poor land in the parish of Hursley. Average produce per acre is supposed wheat 3 quarters, barley 3½, oats 6.

137 Hurstbourne Tarrant

It is generally esteemed to be a fair crop, and understood to yield tolerably well.

210 Kings Somborne with Little Somborne and Stockbridge

The account here given of the several sorts of grain is not strictly accurate, as the farmers are very shy of giving information. On the whole however it is tolerably correct: but it will never be perfectly so, unless the suspicions of the landholders could be done away, or the power of enforcing a return on oath lodged with the person, who is required to obtain it. Potatoes rarely planted, except in gardens for private use. This return is in some measure a clue for every succeeding year, and with a very little variation either in the grain or the quantity will be the growth of this parish from generation to generation. Beans, the land here is too light for the growth of beans. Turnips or rape sown merely for feed of sheep. Rye cut green for cattle. N.B. the crops have been immense beyond all comparison with former years.

149 Linkenholt

The land of this parish is divided into two farms and occupied by two different people. The number of acres of one farm only is here inserted, as the occupier of the other refuses to give any information, what number of acres of his farm, has been, during the present year under growth of grain etc.

150 Liss

The remarks I have been able to collect are, that the crops have been generally favourable. This is the statement received from the farmers and others occupying land in the parish of Liss between 12th September and 13th October 1801.

151 Longstock

By reading the Bishop's letter on this subject in my church and by opportunities of conversing with the farmers at other times, I have reason to believe the preceding statement tolerably correct. I must however observe to your Lordship that in some instances I met with objections, owing to no penalties having been affixed on denials to my questions: I hear from my brother clergymen that the like obstacles have occurred with them, and I firmly believe no exact amount of these articles can be obtained without an act of the legislature to enforce it.

275 Martyr Worthy

The parish of Martyr Worthy contains about 1,660 acres of which about 1,600 acres are arable, the remainder meadow or pasture. The largest farm containing 643 acres was left in a very impoverished state by the last occupier therefore less grain has been sown for the last two years than usual: and the usual quantity will not be sowed for a year or two more, till the ground is brought into good order. Potatoes, none planted except in gardens. I believe there is sufficient crop in the several gardens for the supply of the inhabitants consisting of about 180 persons, men, women and children.

157 Middleton alias Longparish

Two farmers in this parish of the names of Matcham and Allee have refused to give any information what number of acres they have had under growth of corn. The inclosed account is the number of acres returned by the remaining landholders.

160 Minstead with Lyndhurst

This is as accurate a return as I am able to make.

162 Monk Sherborne and Pamber

In consequence of a letter from my Diocesan the Lord Bishop of Winchester written to me at your Lordship's request, desiring I would obtain information from my parishioners of Monk Sherborne and Pamber, what number of acres with the different species of grain they had sown, I convened a meeting of the respective occupiers of land, and after acquainting them with the purport of it, they objected to give me any statement of the number of acres sown last year, as desired by Government.

170 Newnham

Potatoes in this parish are generally planted in small parcels in gardens for the use of the family; the amount of which may perhaps be about 1½ acres.

172 Newton Valence with Hawkley

I conceive the wheat, barley and oat crop to be beyond the common average. The number of acres includes both parishes.

223 North Stoneham

Oats a very light crop in many places. Potatoes, those in gardens, and in the small fields adjoining the cottages are not here included.

239 North Waltham

General produce of wheat half a load per acre, barley 4 quarters, oats 4 quarters, peas 3½ quarters. Number of acres under plough 1,500, 200 acres of first clover and other seeds, 200 acres of second clover, 200 acres of fallow.

- 174 Nursling
I have reason to believe that this statement is pretty accurate, an inquiry has been made with respect to every individual, who has sown his ground with grain, and the other specified articles in the present year. The arable land in the parish consists of about 1,200 acres.
- 175 Oakley
The whole extent of the parish consists of 1,500 acres including woods.
- 179 Penton Mawsey
This account can hardly be considered as the general return of grain etc. in the parish, because the tenant of the great farm (which is rather above half of the parish, and which the annexed paper will in some measure show) quitting has corned every inch of land it was in his power to do, and which the coming in tenant will not do. The crops have been superabundant.
- 180 Penton Mawsey (Details of individual farms given for 179 above.)
- 182 Portchester
About 200 acres in sundry kinds of produce are supposed to be not returned, cause unknown.
- 183 Portsmouth
The (?) of Portsmouth is almost entirely confined within the walls of the (?), and produces none of the species of grain or any of the articles here specified. The small quantity of ground without the walls is entirely applied to pastures.
- 189 Rowner
The parish of Rowner is very small.
- 191 St Bartholomew
The crops in general far exceed the average produce, and collected without the smallest damage from the weather.
- 201 Selborne
No true return can be made by the incumbent of the number of acres sown in this parish. For while some occupiers of land very readily gave their different quantities, others were as much averse from it. And as the tithes are neither taken in kind, nor compounded for by the acre, he had no easy means of obtaining the information desired with any tolerable accuracy.
- 203 Shalden
The farmers of Shalden I found it out of my power to prevail on to make any return. I have delayed returning this paper as long as possible in hopes they would alter their resolution and am sorry to add without effect.

207 Sherfield on Loddon

I have endeavoured, but I am sorry to say without effect, to comply with the wishes of His Majesty's Ministers; I find a general disinclination among the occupiers in my parish to furnish the information desired, under an apprehension as I conceive, that the intelligence requested may be employed against themselves by land and tithe owners. The Lord Bishop's letter was not received early enough for me to return an answer by the 15th instant.

202 Silchester

More wheat raised in this parish this year than in former years.

212 Southampton All Saints

One farmer occupying land in two parishes, namely St Mary's and All Saints included fourteen of these in his return to the rector of St Mary's, from which they should be deducted. (Editor's note: the necessary adjustments have been made in the tables.)

130 Southampton Holy Rood

Arable acres, none in my parish.

214 Southampton Jesus Free Chapel

The crops in general abundant. Potatoes 15 acres more or less, peas 1 acre not quite and very bad. N.B. this is but a part of the parish of St Mary Southampton parted from it by the river Itchen and therefore called St Mary Extra.

213 Southampton SS. John and Lawrence

Arable acres, none of any sort.

215 Southampton St Mary's

There are two chapelries of ease to the parish of St Mary's viz. Pear Tree and South Stoneham by the ministers of which, returns will be made.

216 Southampton St Michael

Arable acres, none of any sort.

219 Southwick

About 150 acres are supposed by an old inhabitant of the place not to be returned from want of inclination or some unknown cause.

221 Stoke Charity

Wheat generally sown this number of acres, barley and oats the same. Potatoes very seldom sown in the fields, peas not often sown, beans never sown, turnips or rape the usual quantity sown, rye never sown.

224 Stratfield Saye

Many of the poor in Stratfield Saye have small gardens of potatoes,

taken by permission of the lord of the manor (Lord Rivers) out of the waste land. It is imagined that the average produce of the wheat will be about 22 bushels (or 5½ sacks) per acre. The crops of all the grains are said to be good.

225 Stratfield Turgis

The observations made on the parish of Stratfield Saye will apply equally to this adjoining parish also.

227 Tadley

A very poor parish, not a quarter of it in cultivation: the inhabitants are anxious for enclosing the waste lands.

230 Thraxton

Wheat good, but not so good as barley and oats, barley an abundant crop, oats an abundant crop, potatoes exclusive of garden potatoes. This account tolerably though not quite accurate. The rector would have sent it sooner, but he waited to make it more and more correct.

233 Titchfield

Wheat and barley crops abundant and well got in, oats crops tolerably good. In so large a parish, it was impossible to make the return sooner, I hope it is of no material consequence not being made within the time specified.

236 Twyford

The vicar has taken great pains and been at some expense to procure as accurate an account of each article as he possibly could do. Not one farmer would give him any account. He therefore sent a person whose business it is to measure land, to procure him the adjoined statement. This appears the only method Government can take to ascertain correctly the number of acres under each article. The growers of corn have had meetings to consult what answers they should give to the clergy. The answer given to the vicar of Twyford was "That they would not say how many acres of wheat etc. they had sown unless compelled by an act of Parliament."

6 Upham with Durley

This calculation has been made by a person, a good judge of quantity and quality of crops. The crops in these limited parishes, exceed all other years, both in seed sown, and in yielding corn. Potatoes, confined to garden cultivation; therefore none (?) in the schedule. Peas and beans, sown in very small quantities, and impossible to ascertain the number of acres. No rye whatever.

247 Warblington

Number of acres at 107 rods per acre.

249 Warnford

The produce of wheat I am informed on an average is about $\frac{1}{2}$ a load per acre, barley about 3 quarters and oats about 4 quarters.

274 West Worldham

This I have reason to think a correct account.

255 Whitchurch with Freefolk

Potatoes none but in small gardens. This account is nearly accurate although, on application several farmers have declined giving in any statement whatever.

258 Wickham

The clergy appear to be very improper agents in obtaining any information from farmers, who are always suspicious of some interested views in those to whom they pay tithes.

260 Winchester St Lawrence

The whole parish of St Lawrence is confined within the city of Winchester, and consequently does not contain any arable land whatever.

261 Winchfield

Wheat full 6 sacks average per acre, not barley country, oats tolerable crops. Potatoes (?) Sir (?) (?) who grows a great quantity which makes them cheap. Peas remarkable good, beans very good. No seed turnips of any consequence. This account is perhaps not quite correct as the farmers are very fearful that the clergyman should be acquainted with the value of the tithes.
